This module introduces students to the wide diversity of music in its relation to the sacred, in and outside different denominational church contexts. The module is team taught, drawing on the variety of research specialisms of staff in ITIA and the Divinity School. It will address topics such as the sacred in Pop Music, Music Theatre, and Opera, as well as in Contemporary Christian Music (e.g. Christian Pop, Hip Hop, and Praise and Worship), Gregorian and contemporary chant (e.g. Iona and Taizé chant), traditional Catholic and Anglican music, and the relationship between music and liturgy in different Christian denominations. Students will be exposed to a range of theological arguments underpinning some of the culture wars in contemporary church music, and learn to articulate their own views and interrogate their own musical practice in relation to these. Assessment takes the form of two coursework essays (4,000 words each).
