Key considerations include the significance of scriptural reasoning in the articulation of theological arguments; the relationship between faith and philosophy; the emergence of what might be deemed in some sense systematic theology; and the connections between doctrinal themes and Christian practice. We seek to engage closely with primary texts, biblical and patristic; we invite close reflection on the ways in which early Christian theology developed, the reasons why it took the forms it did, and the implications of this inheritance for theological work today.
