Introduction to the 1000 & 2000 Level Module Catalogue

The main body of the Catalogue is presented in Sections relating to the Academic Schools in the University. In addition, there are sections for Interdisciplinary Modules (section 23), Music (section 24), English Language Teaching Modules (section 25), Evening Programme Modules (section 26) and Distance Learning Modules (section 27).

Explanation of Fields in Module Entries

Module number and Title. Self-explanatory - module numbers are unique. The third character indicates the module level.

Academic Year. The academic session (whether current or planned) in which the module will be offered.

SCOTCAT Credits. The number of credits associated with a module gives an indication of the amount of learning involved. For example, 1000-level modules in the School of Art History are each worth 20 credits. One credit represents the outcome achievable by the average student through 10 notional hours of learner effort. In practice, one full-time undergraduate year is considered to be 120 credits worth of learning (or 1,200 notional hours of learning).

SCQF Level. The Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF) Levels provide an indication of the complexity of qualifications and learning. See http://scqf.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/2014/03/SCQF-Revised-Level-Descriptors-Aug-2012-FINAL-web-version1.pdf

Semester. The Semester or Semesters in which the module is taught. 'Whole Year' means that it is taught across the two semesters. The St Andrews teaching year has two semesters (September - December, and January - May).

Availability Restrictions. If a module is available but with constraints, these particular restrictions will be clarified in this field.

Planned Timetable. Where a single time is given (e.g. 9.00 am) the class meets for one hour. If days of the week are not specified, the class meets every day from Monday to Friday, with the usual exception of Wednesday afternoons. Further details may be provided in this field.

Description. This is a brief statement of the content of a module.

Pre-requisite(s). Modules or qualifications which must be passed prior to this module. Modules may have pre-requisites reflecting the assumption that they build upon previous knowledge gained. So, for example, the pre-requisite for entry to 2000-level modules in French is a pass in either or both of the 1000-level modules. In the case of certain modules, largely 1000 level, pre-requisites may be framed in terms of specified passes at Higher or A-level. The Head of the relevant School has the authority to waive a pre-requisite. Where the pre-requisite is not simply a pass in another module but includes a grade (eg, '11 or better') the number refers to the 20-point reporting scale.

Co-requisite(s). A module which must be taken in the same academic session as the one listed.

Anti-requisite(s). Students may not take a module if they have already passed or are currently taking any module or other qualification specified as an anti-requisite to it.

Learning and Teaching Methods and Delivery. This gives the anticipated **Weekly Contact** hours with academic staff and the formal breakdown of **Scheduled Learning/Guided Independent Study** as defined by the Quality Assurance Agency (QAA).

Weekly Contact. This will be an indication of the weekly teaching provision for each student. Where the pattern of teaching varies from week to week, **the average weekly contact is given**. Various activities may be included. (tutorials, laboratory work, practical sessions, lectures, fieldwork, consultation hours etc).

Scheduled Learning - time spent with an academic member of staff.

Guided Independent Study - time which a student is expected to undertake alone but often under direction.

Assessment pattern. A brief description of the distribution between assessed coursework and formal examination. A percentage breakdown of which elements of assessment qualify in each Quality Assurance Agency (QAA) defined category are also given. These may match the narrative description ("As used by St Andrews"), or they may differ slightly because some elements of Coursework (Class Tests for example) can be considered Written Examinations in a QAA context.

Re-assessment pattern. This is the method by which a module will be re-assessed if it is failed in the main assessment.

Module Co-ordinator. The academic member of staff responsible for this module, or the contact point for further information.

This module is an introduction to molecular and cellular biology. It covers cell diversity and the origins of life, cellular structures and fundamental processes. The central dogma of molecular biology is investigated through the examination of the structure and function of DNA, RNA and proteins, and how this knowledge led to modern developments in biotechnology. The final section of the module gives an introduction into molecular and population genetics with an emphasis on the process of evolution. Throughout the module the lecture material is complemented by extensive practical classes where biological laboratory techniques are taught an practiced through, for example, microscopy, DNA isolation, dissection and thin layer chromatography.

This module provides an introduction to the diversity of life on Earth and will address key elements of organismal and ecological aspects of life. The module is divided into several sections beginning with the classification of life and an introduction to the kingdoms Monera, Fungi and Protista. Photosynthesis, respiration and the evolution and diversity of plants will be studied. Students will then look at the diversity of animals in the sea and the movement of some groups onto land. The module will also provide an introduction to animal behaviour and developmental biology, before finishing off by introducing ecology and the various factors promoting and threatening biodiversity. Throughout the module the lecture material is complemented by extensive practical classes introducing a variety of fieldwork and laboratory techniques.

This module will help students develop essential academic and transferable skills, with major emphasis on problem solving. This will be achieved through a combination of interactive lectures, independent data-handling workshops and group work on a mini research project. The module will start with an introduction to the scientific method, experimental design, understanding and presenting data. Students will then learn various statistical tests using a code-based statistical software and build their confidence in independent data-handling workshops. Regular mathematics for biologists classes will allow students to practise manipulating equations, performing laboratory calculations etc. A mini project on which the students work in small groups will help them apply the principles learned. The module will also cover scientific essay writing, record keeping and good laboratory practice.

The vast majority of animals are invertebrates - they do not have backbones. This module surveys the major invertebrate groups, emphasizing the diversity of body plans while demonstrating how the common functional requirements such as feeding, reproduction, respiration and excretion are achieved. The module starts with the simplest animals such as sponges and jellyfish, and considers how these primitive animals may have arisen from non-animal ancestors. It continues with a description of the several groups of worms, and the molluscs and arthropods. The last major group discussed are the echinoderms, which are close invertebrate relatives to vertebrate animals such as ourselves. The economic, social, and scientific impact that invertebrates have on human society is identified. The evolutionary relations between the various groups is the common thread that binds this diversity into a coherent story. A series of practical exercises reinforces and complements the lecture component of this module.

The period covered runs from the origins of the Greek city-state in the archaic period, through the heyday of Athens' empire and democracy in the fifth century, to Alexander the Great's conquest of the Persian Empire. The module examines both the political and military history of the Greek world in this period and a range of other themes: amongst them, the impact of slavery on Greek culture, the distinctive Greek construction of sexuality, religious beliefs and practices, and the nature of Greek interactions with other, non-Greek peoples. It also looks beyond the major centres (Athens, Sparta) at a range of other lesser-known cities and sites. All sources are studied in translation, and the module does not take for granted any previous study; the objective of the module is to give you both the wide background and the tools of source criticism required to pursue the study of ancient history further.

The two central themes are the progressive expansion of Roman power abroad and the development and eventual collapse of republican government at home. The module combines political and military history with economic, social and cultural analysis as it explores how Roman (and Italian) society was transformed by the imperial experience. It will cover a wide range of topics including religion, slavery, poverty and the economy. The module is grounded in the close analysis of written sources (all studied in translation) and archaeological evidence. It will give you a solid background in Roman history to Augustus and develop your skills in critical thinking and historical reasoning, preparing you for further study of ancient history.

We look among other things at the relationship between texts and images in the expression of cultural values; and we examine a series of major themes in Greek views of identity, morality, politics and religion. The module is meant both for students who intend to take Honours Classical Studies and for those who want a fascinating introduction to the poetry and art of the ancient Greek world. It is intended to be complemented by CL1005.

We will also discuss the societal implication of detecting life outside Earth. The course will start by studying the origins and evolution of life on Earth and will use this as a framework for how to search for life in our Solar System and beyond. Due to the wide range of scientific topics covered, the course will be suitable for non-science majors as well as those in the sciences. A key component of the course will be to examine science as a way of knowing by looking at the scientific process, how scientific theories are developed and refuted, and discuss the burden of proof for extraordinary claims.

Geography is the study of the world around us, and how it is changing and has changed. The module encourages students to think 'geographically' about particular physical and human dimensions of global change: environmental, atmospheric, hydrological, geomorphological and palaeoecological change; and demographic and economic change. These geographical themes will be framed by a discussion of the nature and evolution of geography as a discipline, and how thinking 'geographically' involves understanding the operation of and interactions between complex bio-physical and social processes. The module explores how the geographer views such processes through the conceptual lenses of time, space, context, scale and variation, and using field, laboratory and model-based methods. Classroom instruction is complemented by lab work which develops key skills in cartography and Geographic Information Science.

The different lecture blocks in the module on environmental management, ecological change, health inequalities, and cultural difference - explore these folds between time and space. The module prepares students for entry to Honours Geography, and, through a residential fieldtrip, broadens their geographic interests and skills in physical and human geography.

Theory is central to the discipline of International Relations. It is theory that distinguishes the field from the study of history, current affairs or journalism and makes the subject area more than simple descriptive thought. This module examines the main current theories in IR and provides an overview of their main theoretical approaches to the study of IR, from Liberalism and Realism; through Constructivism and the English School, to radical Marxist and Neo-Marxist perspectives as well as Feminism, Post-Colonialism and Postmodernism. The main purpose of this module is to facilitate a comprehensive understanding of how major scholars, past and contemporary, have theorised about the dynamics of international relations. The theories generally make a number of propositions which sometimes offer conflicting perspectives, but also occasionally overlap. Our main task will be to outline, critique, compare and contrast the assumptions and values which underlie each of these theories so students may enhance their own critical understanding of IR as well as form their own perspectives.

The medical course takes the form of an integrated spiral curriculum, where teaching in all relevant subjects is delivered grouped holistically or by systems and revisited with increasing complexity throughout the course. Foundations of Medicine 1 and 2 form the initial turn of the spiral in which fundamentally important knowledge is reviewed. During subsequent turns of the spiral, the topics covered in these two modules will be revisited at a more advanced level and with increasing clinical application. A series of core, introductory clinical cases illustrates the clinical context throughout Foundations of Medicine 1 and 2. Foundations of Medicine 1 provides a general overview of the structure and functions of the body systems from the microscopic to the macroscopic level: reviews molecular and cellular medicine; gives a preliminary introduction to medical ethics and communication skills relevant to medicine; uses clinical problems to develop an understanding of the levels of consciousness and the assessment of health status. The module also includes an anatomical overview of the major body systems and the dissection of the back.

Though it may seem like a rather narrow view, crime and passion are, arguably, the driving forces behind every branch of the arts. During this course, we'll be unpacking these deceptively simple terms, 'crime' and 'passion', with the intention of determining the motivating factors behind, persistent themes in, and popular responses to, a number of major works that have appeared since 1900. Many questions will be raised and addressed along the way. What, for example, constitutes a 'crime'? Is it a simple problem of legislature, or is there an ongoing tension between legislation and ethical common sense? What is 'passion', and in what forms can it become manifest? Looking back over the long twentieth century, we will be thinking about these terms, how the arts have addressed them, and how, both individually and collectively, we can be inspired, influenced, enlightened and (potentially) corrupted by artistic output.

Next, we focus on three city case studies to see how life as experienced contributes to theoretical analysis. Finally, we consider how the city is imagined, as represented in film, literature and music, and what this adds to our understanding of urban life. From Ur to Athens to Motown, this module also incorporates academic skills training in some of the tutorials.
